Writing Humorous Songs

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I. Introduction

- A. Do a class on humor in song? Oy!
 - 1. I don't know how. Does anyone?
 - 2. Ask 5 different bards, get 50 different answers maybe more.
 - 3. There is no one right way to do it.
- B. Humor is a very personal thing.
 - 1. Style is largely a matter of individual philosophy and mood of the time.
 - 2. Different things are funny to different people. Know your audience.
 - 3. Do no harm. If you're going to write a praise song, make sure the subject won't be made unhappy by it.
 - 4. How thick is that trowel? Humor can be applied with a rapier, sledge, or and tool in between. Reactions will be different depending on just how heavy-handed you are.
- C. What is Funny?
 - 1. Lots of attempts to explain this; from serious scholars, to playwrights, to androids on Star Trek. Ultimately no one knows.
 - 2. Words with a 'K' (actually a hard 'C') are funny.
 - 3. Pain is funny.
 - 4. Don't **try** to be funny. You'll probably be trying too hard and wind up forcing things.

II. The Humors of Comedy.

- A. Low Comedy. Very broad stuff, usually physical humor. [Der Fuehrer's Face]
- B. The Sumo High-Dive. Mixing two things that have no business being together. [The Vatican Rag]
- C. Nose Tweaking. Poke fun at a well known figure or institution. [John Birch Society]
- D. Glad It's Not Me. Watching something rotten happen to somebody else. [Hello Muddah, Hello Fadduh]
- E. Bait & Switch. Unexpectedly yanking that one vital can from the base of the tower, and having it all come tumbling down. [The Hunting Song]
- F. Familiar, but Off Kilter. A well known song delivered in an unexpected style. **[Black Velvet Doo Wop]**
- G. Word Play. Puns, malapropos, mis-stressed syllables, and mispronounced words. **[The Gnu Song]**
- H. Bawdy Song. Double entendre and indirection; the humor comes from the verbal tension of not saying what you're saying. **[Watkin's Ale]**
- I. Unexplainable. Sometimes there is no explanation of why something is funny it just is. The humor is all in your mind. [John & Marsha]
- J. Jack Benny's seven principles: the joke, exaggeration, ridicule, ignorance, surprise, the pun, and the comic situation.¹

III. Humor Meets Song Writing.

- A. All Standard Rules Apply. The criteria for what makes a good song don't change, they get added to. In addition to poetry, form, meter, meaning, and singability; you can add 'Is it funny'.
- B. Have Something to Say. Even telling a joke needs to have a point to it. You need to have an idea behind your song that you can talk about for a few minutes.
- C. The 2 Line Rule. Often times you'll get hit with an idea for a funny bit. It may give you two very funny opening lines, but that's all. **[Schticks of One]** A song needs to have more meat to it.
- D. It Doesn't Have to Be Funny. Humor can be used in a song that's not meant to be funny. A funny line or two can serve to heighten whatever other emotions you're working with. [Dry Your Eyes My Gypsy]
- E. Have a Sounding Board. What's funny inside your head may not play so well elsewhere. An outside set of ears may hear things yours don't.

IV. Specific Comedic Forms.

- A. Parody. A re-writing of another tune that pokes fun at the original. You usually need a strong piece for the source material of a good parody. [An III Wind]
- B. Satire. Often to a preexisting tune, but not always. Usually has more bite than a parody. Often contains social or political commentary. Not necessarily intended to be humorous. [Lincoln Park Pirates] The line between satire and parody can get very blurry.
